Dr. Tator is a world-renowned expert on concussion and spinal cord injury, prevention and treatment research. Dr. Tator's influence in the medial field has been particularly important in the area of sports and recreation - with his professional and advocacy efforts resulting in new legislation and guidelines around injury prevention, with a particular focus on concussions in recent years.

Dr. Tator is currently involved in various research and prevention efforts - including the Canadian Brain Bank, which oversees research conducted on the brains of athletes and other individuals who have donated their brains to further research.

Dr. Tator has been recognized for his contributions to the field in various ways - including being appointed a Member of the Order of Canada (2000) and being inducted into both the Terry Fox Hall of Fame (2003) and the Canadian Medical Hall of Fame (2009)
